

SUBMITS PLAN FOR OPERATION OF NEW SCHOOL

Deep Creek Board Tells Government Its Requirement In Regard To Cradock

WILLING TO SUPERVISE BUT NOT TO BEAR EXPENSE

The school board of Deep Creek district, Norfolk county, is at present awaiting word from the government relative to the proposal submitted by the educators in connection with the operation of the public school to be built in Cradock, the new community center now in the course of construction in the Paradise creek section.

The government recently indicated a desire to have the county school authorities take over the Cradock school. The matter had attention in the Deep Creek school board and a counter proposal was made by the educators embracing the terms under which they will approve of the school plans and specifications and select a corps of teachers.

It is expressly stipulated, however, that all expenses in connection with the maintenance and upkeep of the school are to be borne by the government until Cradock becomes a part of county territory.

District's Proposal

Arrangements under which the Deep Creek district is to take over the building when Cradock becomes a part of the district, are also set forth in the proposal submitted to the government, which is as follows:

"Inasmuch as the town of Cradock, which is now being built by the United States housing corporation, will very probably in the near future be released by the United States government and become a part of Deep Creek district in the county of Norfolk, and since the government desires the county to provide school facilities or take over the building which they may erect when this territory becomes a part of the county; therefore, be it resolved.

"First—That the Deep Creek school board of the county of Norfolk wishes the United States housing corporation to erect, furnish and equip a school building at Cradock, the size of said building, with plans, specifications and cost, also cost of furniture and equipment to be approved by the board and division superintendent.

Second—"That all expense of maintenance and upkeep must be borne by the government until this territory becomes a part of the county.

Third—"That the board is now willing to select a corps of teachers and to superintend the school.

Fourth—"That when this town becomes county property and the district begins to derive revenue from the same, the Deep Creek school board of the county of Norfolk will take over the school property, provided there are a sufficient number of pupils to maintain it, at a value to be fixed by three competent architects, one to be selected by the school board, one by the government and these to select one—but in fixing this value the basis must be the cost at which the building might be constructed at the time the property is released, together with its depreciation."

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
